
I loved reading about "The River of Life" yesterday both in Revelation and Ezekiel. The two are obviously connected. I now want to focus on what this prophetic parable means in a different way. The Ezekiel version mentions how that when the River enters the Dead Sea, the salty water will become fresh. But it mentions something very interesting. It says: ¹¹ But the swamps and marshes will not become fresh; they will be left for salt.

Why? Does it have something to do with the fact that some bitterness will endure for eternity---like little pockets of Hell? Let's dive deeper into the River of Life!

Let's pick up here.

¹⁰ ... The fish will be of many kinds—like the fish of the Mediterranean Sea. ¹¹ But the swamps and marshes will not become fresh; they will be left for salt.

Why? The NIV Study Bible speculates that perhaps it is to provide the salt needed for sacrifices. But I want to proposes another alternative. Remember the story about Lot's wife in the Old Testament, as he and his daughters were escaping Sodom?

Genesis 19:26 New International Version (NIV)

²⁶ But Lot's wife looked back, and she became a pillar of salt.

Christ felt very strongly about this example.

Luke 17:22-33 New International Version (NIV)

²² Then he said to his disciples, "The time is coming when you will long to see one of the days of the Son of Man, but you will not see it. ²³ People will tell you, 'There he is!' or 'Here he is!' Do not go running off after them. ²⁴ For the Son of Man in his day^[a] will be like the lightning, which flashes and lights up the sky from one end to the other. ²⁵ But first he must suffer many things and be rejected by this generation.

²⁶ "Just as it was in the days of Noah, so also will it be in the days of the Son of Man. ²⁷ People were eating, drinking, marrying and being given in marriage up to the day Noah entered the ark. Then the flood came and destroyed them all.

²⁸ "It was the same in the days of Lot. People were eating and drinking, buying and selling, planting and building. ²⁹ But the day Lot left Sodom, fire and sulfur rained down from heaven and destroyed them all.

³⁰ "It will be just like this on the day the Son of Man is revealed. ³¹ On that day no one who is on the housetop, with possessions inside, should go down to get them. Likewise, no one in the field should go back for anything. ³² Remember Lot's wife! ³³ Whoever tries to keep their life will lose it, and whoever loses their life will preserve it.

1. Luke 17:24 Some manuscripts do not have *in his day*.

The lesson is that if you look "back" too much after beginning on a journey of "escape" and "freedom" with Christ, you will suffer loss! Lot's wife turned into a pillar of salt.

I realize that the angel effectuated that literally. But symbolically, what might it mean? Some have described hell as being similar to black holes in the universe. There are pockets of isolated places from which light cannot escape. Well, what if this vision of life being restored to the Dead Sea pictures this? It's mostly alive----but there will be pockets of "death" and bitterness (marshes and swamps) that will not become fresh! Not because they couldn't if they wanted to! Here is another biblical example I think pertains.

Exodus 15 New International Version (NIV)

²² Then Moses led Israel from the Red Sea and they went into the Desert of Shur. For three days they traveled in the desert without finding water. ²³ When they came to Marah, they could not drink its water because it was bitter. (That is why the place is called Marah.^[f]) ²⁴ So the people grumbled against Moses, saying, "What are we to drink?"

²⁵ Then Moses cried out to the LORD, and the LORD showed him a piece of wood. He threw it into the water, and the water became fit to drink.

Ok, perhaps I'm stretching it---but we have a piece of wood we can throw into the waters of our bitterness! It's the cross of Christ! It represents forgiveness of those that have wronged you!

It was exhibited by Christ and Stephen.
