Amos 1 New International Version (NIV)

I want to pick up with this story, because it's rich, for one, and it shows two things:

# 1. How your "roots" in life do indeed show up in your "fruits" over and over.

# 2. And a template for disaster---Edom's Esau like retention of bitterness and anger. Let's go through the story again.

<sup>11</sup>This is what the LORD says:

"For three sins of Edom, even for four, I will not relent. Because he pursued his brother with a sword and slaughtered the women of the land, because his anger raged continually and his fury flamed unchecked,

## All of these various translations speak of a man who harbors bitterness and anger. Think about that concept. "Harboring" bitterness. Look at the definition of "harbor."

keep (a thought or feeling, typically a negative one) in one's mind, especially secretly.<sup>3</sup>

It's a "a place on the coast where vessels may find shelter, especially one protected from rough water by piers, jetties, and other artificial structures."

## Esau harbored his anger and bitterness, and the Lord warned him of the just how unprofitable that was.

What did Esau have to be so angry about? Lots.

He was the son of Isaac and Rebekah, a fraternal twin of Jacob, and the boys wrestled against each other from before birth.

They were two totally different kinds of individuals. And their parents played favorites. All the classic things that should not happen in childrearing and family dynamics happened. And the result was one embittered man who "harbored" rage. He gave it a place to simmer and stew.

#### **Genesis 25**

<sup>1</sup>Isaac prayed to the LORD on behalf of his wife, because she was childless. The LORD answered his prayer, and his wife Rebekah became pregnant. <sup>22</sup>The babies jostled each other within her, and she said, "Why is this happening to me?" So she went to inquire of the LORD.

<sup>23</sup>The LORD said to her,

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"Two nations are in your womb,
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and two peoples from within you will be separated;

one people will be stronger than the other,

and the older will serve the younger."

<sup>24</sup> When the time came for her to give birth, there were twin boys in her womb. <sup>25</sup> The first to come out was red, and his whole body was like a hairy garment; so they named him Esau. <sup>26</sup> After this, his brother came out, with his hand grasping Esau's heel; so he was named Jacob. Isaac was sixty

years old when Rebekah gave birth to them.

Below seems like selfish preferential treatment to me.

<sup>27</sup>The boys grew up, and Esau became a skillful hunter, a man of the open country, while Jacob was content to stay at home among the tents. <sup>28</sup>Isaac, who had a taste for wild game, loved Esau, but Rebekah loved Jacob.

<sup>29</sup>Once when Jacob was cooking some stew, Esau came in from the open country, famished. <sup>30</sup>He said to Jacob, "Quick, let me have some of that red stew! I'm famished!" (That is why he was also called Edom.)

<sup>31</sup> Jacob replied, "First sell me your birthright."

<sup>32</sup> "Look, I am about to die," Esau said. "What good is the birthright to me?"

<sup>33</sup>But Jacob said, "Swear to me first." So he swore an oath to him, selling his birthright to Jacob.

<sup>34</sup> Then Jacob gave Esau some bread and some lentil stew. He ate and drank, and then got up and left.

So Esau despised his birthright.

Esau is recorded as "despising" his birthright. As you see in the text box, this is called "godless" in the New Testament.

He loved his gratification of what seemed like and overwhelming physical needs to than he did his birthright. (See text box again---this is also related to giving in to what seems to be "overwhelming" sexual need or lust.) He cheapened it by selling it for a bowl of red soup. Also, Jacob did steal it---took advantage of him a point of weakness, and simply deceived him out of it. He also, under the direction of his mother, stole away his blessing from his father as well, which apparently is huge.

Genesis 27:41 New International Version (NIV) <sup>41</sup>Esau held a grudge against Jacob because of the blessing his father had given him. He said to himself, "The days of mourning for my father are near; then I will kill my brother Jacob."

## And apparently the "nation" Edom became did the same thing. He:

- pursued- his brother with the sword
- corrupted his own compassions
- his anger is ravenous continually
- his rage, he keeps it permanently

Hebrews 12:16 New International Version (NIV) <sup>16</sup>See that no one is sexually immoral, or is godless like Esau, who for a single meal sold his inheritance rights as the oldest son.

Sexual incontinence is also associated with food (gratification of a normal human need) in this force.

1 Corinthians 6:13 New International Version (NIV)

<sup>13</sup>You say, "Food for the stomach and the stomach for food, and God will destroy them both." The body, however, is not meant for sexual immorality but for the Lord, and the Lord for the body. So obviously the life lesson for us---don't keep pursuing your wrongdoing brother with you implement of revenge, your sword (primarily our lips these days and the words that come out).

Don't stifle natural, God-given compassions. You have to work to do that. Let compassion flow.

Don't let your anger go unchecked. Don't let the sun set down on your wrath. Fulfill it, get it done, move on. And forgive.

And don't feed your rage, nurture it, nurse it, and then harbor it up (in what can become a pretty muck filled harbor in your heart).

Esau let his bitterness "simmer" and "stew," much like the stew Jacob was simmering when he came in from the hunt.

He should opened the harbor of his heart to let love and life course through and clean it out.

Let the river of living waters flow through you, and flush it out of your heart.

#### John 7:38

Whoever believes in me, as Scripture has said, **rivers** of **living water** will flow from within them."
