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Jonah Chapter 2 Part 1²

So Jonah is swallowed by a giant fish. Jonah 1 ends

¹⁵ Then they took Jonah and threw him overboard, and the raging sea grew calm. ¹⁶ At this the men greatly feared the LORD, and they offered a sacrifice to the LORD and made vows to him.

¹⁷ Now the LORD provided a huge fish to swallow Jonah, and Jonah was in the belly of the fish three days and three nights.

What was that all about? We'll pick up here, and move into chapter 2.

Jonah 1:15-2:10

Jonah's Prayer

The NIV treats this section, along with chapter 2, as one unit. I'll follow along with NIV for most of my commentary.

¹⁷ Now the LORD provided a huge fish to swallow Jonah, and Jonah was in the belly of the fish three days and three nights.

The first thing the NIV commentary comments on is the phrase "The LORD provided." This phrase also occurs in Jonah 4:6-8.

Jonah 4:6-8

⁶Then THE LORD GOD PROVIDED

... a leafy plant and made it grow up over Jonah to give shade for his head to ease his discomfort, and Jonah was very happy about the plant.

⁷ But at dawn the next day **GOD PROVIDED**

a worm, which chewed the plant so that it withered.

⁸ When the sun rose, **GOD PROVIDED**

a scorching east wind, and the sun blazed on Jonah's head so that he grew faint.

... He wanted to die, and said, "It would be better for me to die than to live."

That's how the Lord is. God PROVIDES.

The Hebrew word here and the Greek of Matthew 12:40 are both general terms for a large fish. (literally GREAT FISH)

The great fish is distinguished from the sinister "serpent" of the sea (Amos 9:3) called "Leviathan" and the "monster of the deep."

FYI, Michael Hiser, a popular biblical scholar, says this:

God didn't really fight a literal dragon at the beginning of creation. This imagery reflects the mindset of the ancient world, which viewed the sea as unpredictably violent and unable to be tamed. It frightened the ancients. Only the power of a mighty God could

produce a habitable world from the chaotic sea—a deed portrayed as a battle with the untamed deep. God was victorious in this conflict, as told in Psalm 74 . . . In the ancient world, the original ("primordial") chaotic conditions of creation were often portrayed as a monstrous dragon. This is reflected in stories from ancient Babylon and Israel's closest neighbor, Ugarit (ancient Syria, just north of Israel).

In the literature of ancient Ugarit, the god Baal battles Yamm, who is portrayed as a chaotic, churning sea and a terrifying sea dragon named Tannun or Litanu. These terms are equivalent to the Hebrew words in Psalm 74:13–14: "You divided the sea (בי, yam) by your might; you broke the heads of the sea monsters (תנינים, tanninim) on the waters. You crushed the heads of Leviathan (לויתן, liwyatan)."

Sounds to me like the beasts of Revelation.

In other words, it sounds metaphorical---true, but more "metaphorical" rather than literal.

Three days and three nights: The phrase used may, as in Matthew 12:40, refer to a period of time including one full day and parts of two others.

Again, the NT clearly uses Jonah's experience as a type (foreshadowing) of the burial and resurrection of Jesus, who was entombed for three days and three nights.

Here's a personal observation: God simply could have made a great fish. It doesn't have to be a whale. It could be something God made that Jonah reported as a fish. So if God wanted to create a submarine/fish, he could have done it.

Now notice what this "type" of Jesus does in the "tomb" of the fish. He prays!

2 ¹ From inside the fish Jonah prayed to the LORD his God. ² He said:

"In my distress I called to the LORD, and he answered me.

From deep in the realm of the dead I called for help, and you listened to my cry.

(CLV) Jon 2:2

And he $^{\rm I}$ said, I call, $^{\rm f}$ because of my distress, to Yahweh, And He is answering me. $^{\rm f}$ Out of the belly of the unseen I implore; You hear my voice.

Here is an interesting take on the word Sheol.

Sheol comes from the root word sha'al (שָׁאַל) which means "to ask" or "to inquire" and indicates that Sheol is a place where there are only questions and uncertainty.³

He calls out in his distress:

H6869 tsarah tsaw-raw'

feminine of H6862;

tightness (i.e. figuratively, trouble);

"From the realm of the dead" H7585 sh'owl sheh-ole'

or shol {sheh-ole'};

from H7592; Hades or the world of the dead (as if a subterranean retreat), including its accessories and inmates.
