And we maybe can learn something from this book and God's words in it.

So Micah predicted the fall of Israel's capital, Samaria.

Micah 1:5-7 New International Version

⁵ All this is because of Jacob's transgression, because of the sins of the people of Israel. What is Jacob's transgression? Is it not Samaria?

God always gets to the root of the problem.

What is Judah's high place? Is it not Jerusalem?

So here Judah is being spoken of as a high place. God did not like people to have personal and private "high places." God wanted shared and centralized and corporate spirituality.

⁶ "Therefore I will make Samaria a heap of rubble, a place for planting vineyards. I will pour her stones into the valley and lay bare her foundations.

⁷ All her idols will be broken to pieces; all her temple gifts will be burned with fire;
I will destroy all her images.

Since she gathered her gifts from the wages of prostitutes, as the wages of prostitutes they will again be used."

Cheating on God was considered spiritual prostitution.

The inevitable desolation of Judah was also foretold.

Micah 1:9-16 New International Version

⁹ For Samaria's plague is incurable; it has spread to Judah.

It has reached the very gate of my people, even to Jerusalem itself.

Samaria's sin of religious "modification" to fit their preferred lifestyle and

"preferences" of what could be right and wrong was not something God liked, and he called it an incurable plague.

¹⁰ Tell it not in Gath¹; (the word means to tell) weep not at all.

In Beth Ophrah (the phrase means "House of Dust") roll in the dust.

¹¹ Pass by naked and in shame, you who live in Shaphir. **(Shaphir means pleasant.)** Those who live in Zaanan (the word for this sounds like the word for "come out.") will not come out.

Beth Ezel is in mourning;

it no longer protects you.

¹² Those who live in Maroth writhe in pain, (Maroth sounds like the Hebrew for

conqueror) waiting for relief,

because disaster has come from the LORD, even to the gate of Jerusalem.

¹³ You who live in Lachish, harness fast horses to the chariot.

You are where the sin of Daughter Zion began,

for the transgressions of Israel were found in you.

¹⁴ Therefore you will give parting gifts

to Moresheth Gath.

The town of Akzib will prove deceptive (Akzib means deception)

to the kings of Israel.

¹⁵ I will bring a conqueror against you

who live in Mareshah. (Mareshah sounds like the Hebrew for conqueror)

The nobles of Israel

will flee to Adullam.

¹⁶ Shave your head in mourning

for the children in whom you delight;

make yourself as bald as the vulture,

for they will go from you into exile.

I've already covered what happened historically during this time. But I'll copy it here.

(1) In 734-732 BC Tiglath-Pileser III of Assyria led a military campaign against Aram (Syria), Philistia and parts of Israel and Judah. Askelon and Gaza were defeated. Judah, Ammon, Edom and Moab paid tribute to the Assyrian king, but Israel did not fare as well. According to 2 Kings 15:29, the northern Kingdom lost most of its territory, including all of Gilead and much of Galilee. Damascus fell in 732 and was annexed to the Assyrian Empire. A history from Wikipedia is shared in the text box.³

(2) In 722-721 Samaria fell, and the northern kingdom of Israel was conquered by Assyria.

(3) In 711 King Sargon II of Assyria captured Ashdod.

Literary Structure

There is a wonderful article on the web about appreciating the use of literary structure in the Bible to enhance both our understanding of it and enjoyment of it.

Here's a snippet from it.⁴

Artistry is an important part of the literary nature of the Bible.

God did not neglect beauty when he created the world, and he did not neglect it when he superintended the composition of the Bible. The literary parts of the Bible are replete with artistry, and to pay attention to it and unfold it through analysis is an important part of a literary approach to the Bible. Doing so can add a whole new dimension and level of enjoyment to our reading and study of the Bible. Additionally, we need to operate on the premise that biblical authors regarded everything that they put into their works as important and worthy of our attention, including artistic aspects.
