Therefore, I urge you, brothers and sisters, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as a living **sacrifice**, holy and pleasing to God—this is your true and proper worship.

#### Our whole bodies are meant to be living sacrifices.

# **Ephesians 5:2**

and walk in the way of love, just as Christ loved us and gave himself up for us as a fragrant offering and **sacrifice** to God.

#### More than one Scripture references Jesus as our sacrifice to God. Here He is also

#### called a "fragrant offering."

## **Philippians 2:17**

But even if I am being poured out like a drink offering on the **sacrifice** and service coming from your faith, I am glad and rejoice with all of you.

Paul saw himself as being "poured out" like a "libation," a drink offering. The CLV says he was "a |libation~ on the sacrifice and ministration of your •faith." Philippians 4:18

I have received full payment and have more than enough. I am amply supplied, now that I have received from Epaphroditus the gifts you sent. They are a fragrant offering, an acceptable **sacrifice**, pleasing to God.

# Gifts we give to people doing ministry are considered "fragrant offerings" and acceptable sacrifices that please God.

### Hebrews 13:15

Through Jesus, therefore, let us continually offer to God a **sacrifice** of praise—the fruit of lips that openly profess his name.

### Praise and worship are sacrifices---things that openly profess God's name. Hebrews 13:16

And do not forget to do good and to share with others, for with such **sacrifice**s God is pleased.

#### Sharing with others are sacrifices.
