Woe to Nineveh

3 ¹³ Look at your troops they are all weaklings. The gates of your land are wide open to your enemies; fire has consumed the bars of your gates.

People really depended on their walled cities. And I think there is a metaphor here to for us as individuals. We should have certain "walls" of protection around us. And especially when we sin or let sin into our lives in a dominating way, we open the doors of those gates, and become vulnerable to attacks. Thankfully, the Good Shepherd watches us all.

The NIV says this was normal preparation for a siege. But ironically, it would do no good. It's like when Delilah said to Samson, "Arise Samson, the Philistines are upon you!" And eventually, they were. His "gate" was his loyalty to be separated to God and the symbol that reflected that loyalty. Sadly, the Scripture says others to whom you put yourself into subjection can cost you a degradation of your defenses as well. And our defense, as always, is the Lord.

Judges 16

¹⁶ And it came to pass, when she pressed him daily with her words, and urged him, so that his soul was vexed unto death; ¹⁷ That he told her all his heart, and said unto her, There hath not come a razor upon mine head; for I have been a Nazarite unto God from my mother's womb: if I be shaven, then my strength will go from me, and I shall become weak, and be like any other man.

⁹ And she made him sleep upon her knees; and she called for a man, and she caused him to shave off the seven locks of his head; and she began to afflict him, and his strength went from him. ²⁰ And she said, The Philistines be upon thee, Samson. And he awoke out of his sleep, and said, I will go out as at other times before, and shake myself. And he wist not that the LORD was departed from him.

²¹ But the Philistines took him, and put out his eyes, and brought him down to Gaza, and bound him with fetters of brass; and he did grind in the prison house.

¹⁴ Draw water for the siege, strengthen your defenses! Work the clay, tread the mortar, repair the brickwork!

I wonder how they did make "clay" and "morter"?

According to the Oriental Institute of the University of Chicago, "Brick making was a major Mesopotamian industry, especially in the south, where wood was in short supply and stone was non-existent." Clay was Sumer's most abundant material and with it was mixed sand, water, mud, and organic material, husks or straw. Often, it was sun-dried, as there was little fuel for firing. ³

This was actually consumed by history and archaeology. Here is one depiction.

"Now there was a prophecy which had been handed down to him from his ancestors that "No enemy will ever take Nineveh by storm unless the river shall first become the city's enemy." Assuming, therefore, that this would never be, he held out hope, his thought being to endure the siege and await troops which he hoped would be sent from his subjects . . . The inhabitants of the city had a great abundance of all provisions, since the king had made plans for this situation. Consequently the siege dragged on. . . . But in the third year, after there had been heavy and continuous rains, it came to pass that the Euphrates running very full, inundated a portion of the city and broke down the walls for a distance of 20 stades (approximately 2 1/4 miles.) At this the king, believing that the prophecy was fulfilled and that the river had plainly become the city's enemy, abandoned all hope of saving himself. And in order that he might not fall into the hands of the enemy, he built an enormous pyre in his palace . . . he consigned . . . himself and his palace to flames. . . . the silver and gold was carried off." The rebels, on learning of the death of the king, took the city by forcing an entrance where the wall had fallen." Diodorus Siculus - Book II.

The NIV study bible says that for centuries no one knew where Nineveh itself lay buried. In 1845 it was finally discovered by archaeologists.
