Little is known about Habakkuk except that he was a contemporary of Jeremiah and man of vigorous faith rooted deeply in the religious traditions of Israel.

Comment: How did they know this? The best that I can tell is that they have determined this because of his predictions of the Babylonian invasion.

Habakkuk 1:6 New International Version

⁶I am raising up the Babylonians, [a] that ruthless and impetuous people, who sweep across the whole earth to seize dwellings not their own.

That's the same time Jeremiah prophesied, as well as many others.

The indication is that Habakkuk lived in Judah toward the end of Josiah's reign (640 – 609 BC) or at the beginning of Jehoiakim's reign (609-598). The prophecy is generally dated a little before or after the Battle of Carcemish (605 BC) when Egyptian forces, which had earlier goen to the aide of the Assyrian King, were routed by the under Nabopolassar and Nebuchadnezzar and were pursued as far as the Egyptian border.

A Message About Egypt

46 This is the word of the LORD that came to Jeremiah the prophet concerning the nations:

² Concerning Egypt:

This is the message against the army of Pharaoh Necho king of Egypt, which was defeated at Carchemish on the Euphrates River by Nebuchadnezzar king of Babylon in the fourth year of Jehoiakim son of Josiah king of Judah:

³ "Prepare your shields, both large and small, and march out for battle! ⁴ Harness the horses, mount the steeds! Take your positions with helmets on! Polish your spears, put on your armor! ⁵ What do I see? They are terrified, they are retreating, their warriors are defeated. They flee in haste without looking back, and there is terror on every side."

⁶ "The swift cannot flee nor the strong escape. In the north by the River Euphrates they stumble and fall.

²⁴ Daughter Egypt will be put to shame, given into the hands of the people of the north."

a. **Jeremiah 46:9** That is, the upper Nile region

The Battle of Carchemish was a decisive battle fought in 605 BCE between the remnants of Assyria and their Egyptian mercenary allies led by the king Necho II and the Neo-Babylonia coalition led be Nabopolassar and his son Nebuchadnezzar II...

The major record of the battle is known as the Nebuchadnezzar **Chronicle** which is currently housed in the British Museum. According to the Babylonian account, Nebuchadnezzar and his armies had to cross the Euphrates to crush the Assyrians at Carchemish. The Egyptian army withdrew first and in the aftermath the Assyrians were utterly crushed. The Egyptians that retreated were not so lucky as the Babylonians cut them off at the Hamath district and slaughtered them down to the last man. The Battle of Carchemish is also mentioned in the Bible, such as in the Book of Jeremiah and 2 Chronicles.

That's just a thumbnail sketch of that battle. Assyria was "slaughtered" to the last man! Wow. Egypt's defeat by Babylonia at Carcemesh (the name means fortress of Chemosh) was one of the most decisive battles of the ancient world, and ended Egypt's age long claims and pretensions to power in Syro-Palestine.

²⁵ The LORD Almighty, the God of Israel, says: "I am about to bring punishment on Amon god of Thebes, on Pharaoh, on Egypt and her gods and her kings, and on those who rely on Pharaoh. ²⁶ I will give them into the hands of those who want to kill them—Nebuchadnezzar king of Babylon and his officers. Later, however, Egypt will be inhabited as in times past," declares the LORD. . . "Do not be afraid, Jacob my servant; do not be dismayed, Israel. I will surely save you out of a distant place, your descendants from the land of their exile. Jacob will again have peace and security, and no one will make him afraid. ²⁸ Do not be afraid, Jacob my servant, for I am with you," declares the LORD. "Though I completely destroy all the nations among which I scatter you, I will not completely destroy you. I will discipline you but only in due measure; I will not let you go entirely unpunished."

I think the theme of punishment is amazing. God does punish. But He does so in mercy. And, like it says above, only in "due measure." I looked up the text in the original.

And "your seed from the land of their captivity; And Jacob will return and be given quietness And be tranquil *with no one cmaking him tremble.

I like that phrase. "Be tranquil, with no more making him tremble."

And to be given "quietness."

It reminds me of what Zechariah said in rejoicing in the birth of John the Baptist.
